The request for \$350,000 is for a new facility at the Elliot Street DPW yard, which will house the Parks and Recreation and Police Departments.

The maintenance division of Parks and Recreation is currently located at 70 Crescent Street. This property will no longer be available for this use, and we therefore needed to construct a new facility elsewhere. After looking at a number of sites, the Elliot Street DPW yard was selected due to the synergy with DPW, and the minimal impact to residents. The maintenance division needs a facility to house their equipment, perform maintenance and repair of that equipment, house supplies, and serve as a base location for the maintenance crew.

The Police Department has had a long standing desire for a substation on the south side of the city. This substation would have standard office hours, and would be used for report writing and customer interface. Police Headquarters can be a challenging building to get to with parking scarce in that area. Specifically, the Police Department feels that this substation would be more welcoming and accessible for Newton's elderly population. In addition to the substation, there will be a small training classroom for the NPD. Having training at Police Headquarters is challenging due to the limited parking. There is also increased departmental efficiency by not having to have police officers on the south side of the city, drive to the north side to write a report.

To meet the programmatic needs of both departments, we are proposing a prefabricated facility for joint use, with separate entrances. The first phase of design will help us determine the gross building square footage, but I would anticipate a facility between 5000 and 8,000 square feet. We will need to look at a couple of options for site placement of the facility, but our primary focus will be minimizing impact to the neighborhood, while also maximizing accessibility for visitors to the substation. We also need to make sure this facility does not negatively impact DPW operations.

MEMORANDUM

This memorandum responds to a request made members of the Public Safety and Transportation Committee at your February 8, 2017 meeting. Staff was to provide a recommendation to Committee members in terms of any potential changes to how particular traffic and parking requests are handled by the Traffic Council.

Traffic Council's primary function is to examine and vote to make changes to the Traffic and Parking Regulations (TPR). At least 60 requests are handled every year over the course of 10-12 meetings. Traffic Council is also charged with advising the mayor and/or City Council on matters concerning traffic and parking issues affecting the city, upon request.

<u>Staff recommends no change to the process of making changes to the TPR at this time.</u> It is recommended that all requests for stop signs, parking regulations, and every other element of the TPR continue to be handled through the current Traffic Council process. The recommendation to make no change is based on the following:

Staff suggests that that our current practice allows requests to be handled efficiently and
effectively, and does not call out for a change. Any change is vetted through a fair public
process, which provides for citizen input and voting by staff representing various City
departments as well as a resident and an elected official. An appeals process to the City

Council is currently in place, although rarely used. All changes to the TPR are made by the Clerk's office, which maintains the document.

- Any issue of immediate public safety is currently immediately handled by the Police Department, and are subsequently handled by Traffic Council in a timely manner.
- The TPR is currently up to date. This has allowed staff to locate errors and improve various sections of the TPR through the current process.
- Recent staffing changes have allowed staff to take action on certain items that have been
 delayed, such as requests for four-way stop signs. This has been a staffing issue, not a
 process issue.
- Staff is concerned that a change to the current process, albeit with the best intentions, may result in unforeseen consequences.

Traffic Calming is not included as a specific section of the TPR. <u>It is suggested that requests for traffic calming may be more efficiently handled outside of the Traffic Council process</u>. The following requests for Traffic Calming are currently being carried on the Traffic Council long docket:

- <u>COUNCILORS FULLER</u>, <u>BAKER AND LAREDO</u>, requesting an analysis of speeding on Grant Avenue (between Commonwealth Avenue and Ward Street) and potential traffic calming procedures. (Ward 8)
- <u>COUNCILOR ALBRIGHT</u>, requesting traffic calming measures on Lowell Avenue. (Ward 2)
- <u>WARD 2 COUNCILORS</u>, requesting traffic calming measures on Central Avenue, Newtonville. (Ward 2)
- <u>BARBARA BRUSTOWICZ</u>, 12 Radcliff Road, requesting a) a traffic study be conducted for the purpose of analyzing high speed and traffic volume on Radcliff Road and Tamworth Road and b) implementation of traffic control devices, such as stop signs and/or traffic calming measures to deter speeders and address safety concerns. (Ward 5)
- <u>ALD. SANGIOLO</u>, requesting traffic calming measures or a reduction in speed limit on Washington Street between Aspen Avenue and Beacon Street. (Wards 4 & 5)
- ALD. LAPPIN, requesting traffic calming measures on Dudley Road. (Ward 8)

Many other requests for Traffic Calming have not arrived to the attention of staff through the Traffic Council process, but rather through email communication, phone calls, in-person meetings, or through the WebQA/311 system. To handle all the requests for traffic calming that staff receives, we have been working on the development of a scoring system, to be used to review and prioritize requests against one another. Staff suggests that requests for Traffic Calming be removed from the Traffic Council docket, and directed to a different process, to be developed, but which will include an administrative scoring system.
